DISTRICT PARENT INVOLVEMENT PLAN

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PART I: GENERAL EXPECTATIONS:

 - O Meeting topics included sharing various resources available to parents that can be found on district website, www.pangburnschools.org and an assortment of education resources and websites shared by teachers. Volunteer procedures were explained and upcoming parent events of the spring semester were shared including spring Parent-Teacher Conference, as well as athletic, club, musical events. The use of PSD website, Remind APP & District Facebook Page was explained and shared handouts on how to access the programs.
- 2. <u>Pangburn School District</u> will take the following actions to involve parents in the process of school review and improvement under section 1116 of the ESEA:
 - o Conduct the Annual Report to the Public in October 2018.
 - Distribute parent surveys to collect information and data pertaining to identified school improvement areas.
 - A parent advisory committee, including teachers, administrators, and parents will be organized to recommend new parent involvement policies and activities.
- 3. The <u>Pangburn School District</u> will provide the following necessary coordination, technical assistance, and other support to assist Title 1, Part A schools in planning and implementing effective parental involvement activities to improve student academic achievement and school performance:

Jackie Cates, Daycare Director, Becky Baker, HIPPY Coordinator, Kelly Davis, ABC Pre-K Coordinator, Mary Rieck, Elementary Principal, & Elementary Staff Members work together throughout the year to coordinate their programs that help provide support, services and early interventions for young students so they will be prepared for kindergarten and beyond.
- 5. The <u>Pangburn School District</u> will take the following actions to conduct, with the involvement of parents, an annual evaluation of the content and effectiveness of this parental involvement policy in improving the quality of its Title I, Part A schools.

Data will be analyzed by Principals: Rieck, Louks & Collett & District Staff and members of the District Parent Involvement Committee to identify target areas of parental concern and suggestions for program improvement and/or strategies suggested by parents for activities and accommodation that can be made to increase parent participation. Parent Facilitators (Butler & Gregson) will both send notices home with students as well as postings

- related to annual parent survey will be posted on district website, & shared with parents in the bus pick-up line and reminder messages will be sent to parents using the Remind APP.
- Program effectiveness will be evaluated through on-line surveys completed by Superintendent D. Rolland & Counselors — Butler & Gregson as well as Social Worker, Gallegly. Survey data will be analyzed to identify areas for program improvement.
- Parent surveys will be sent home with students. Data will be analyzed by members of District & Campus Parent Involvement Committees to identify target areas of parental concern and suggestions for program improvement and/or strategies suggested by parents for activities and accommodation that can be made to increase parent participation. Parent Facilitators (Butler & Gregson) will both send notices home with students as well as postings related to annual parent survey will be posted on district website and reminder messages will be sent to parents using the Remind APP district website.
- Building and District-level Parent Involvement Committees will meet as needed to review evaluation data and formulate a strategic plan for addressing targeted areas of improvement and the programs/services that will be implemented for each area. Superintendent & Campus Principals and Parent Involvement Committees will compile a list of their suggestions and benefits from the parent functions throughout the school year activities share with staff and parents in April of each year, as well as have the suggestions include in the Annual Report to the Public each fall.
- 6. The <u>Pangburn School District</u> will build the schools' and parent's capacity for strong parental involvement, in order to ensure effective involvement of parents and to support a partnership among the school involved, parents, and the community to improve student academic achievement, through the following activities specifically described below:

- Curriculum standards at each grade level, * Federally funded program components, including Title I 1-Part A, Title 11-A, Title 1V-A, and Title VI, part B, * Information pertaining to on-line grade reporting system that parents can access to monitor student grades, assignments, as well as communicate to their child's teacher. The meetings were held at the High School by Principal Collett on August 9, 2018 and by Principal Rieck at the Elementary on August 9, 2018.
- Information pertaining to the remediation programs at each school campus that will be implemented to address identified areas of deficiency in each core area of the curriculum. The parents of each child enrolled in the school will promptly receive an explanation of what the identification means, the reason (s) the school was identified for improvement, and how parents can become involved in addressing the academic issues that led to the identification. This letter will be distributed before the first day of school and posted on the school's website and campus buildings. Parents will be informed of student progress in comprehension. Parents will engage in activities to support comprehension at Parent Night.
- A list of suggested activities will be provided to parents. Parents will receive information pertaining to the implementation of educational technology that will be integrated into the instructional process in each classroom [Information shared to parents yearly by Rob Hayes, Technology Director and Principals: Louks, Rieck & Collett]. The technology will assist teachers in presenting grade level concepts through various mediums, all of which are designed to meet individual student learning styles, with a focus on the visual presentation that will reduce language barriers and help to close the achievement gap between minority and non-minority students and in order to meet the educational needs of low achieving and limited English proficient students. Parents will be informed of student progress quarterly and a list of suggested activities to support student achievement at home will be provided. Parents will be encouraged to participate on Parent Advisory Committees that will be formed at the building level.
- The school district will, with the assistance of its schools, provide materials and training to help parents work with their children to improve their children's academic achievement, such as literacy training, and using technology, as appropriate, to foster parental involvement: Including Library Parent Night at Elementary School; Pangburn High School will hold an annual parent meeting in the fall for new freshman students and late spring to inform parents about course selections, career planning, and preparation for postsecondary opportunities. School-Parent Compacts will be sent home at each school campus. The compacts will include each components outlined in the Title I, Arkansas Department of Education and newest requirements of ESSA and are verified by Principals Rieck, Louks & Collett each school year.
- The District will maintain a Parent Resource Center at the High School as well as similar materials and resources at each campus that will be accessible to parents through the school library during regular school hours. Informational materials relating to curriculum, study skills, drug and alcohol awareness, and volunteer programs within the school will be available for parents through a library check-out process.

The technology will assist teachers in presenting grade level concepts through various mediums, all of which are designed to meet individual student learning styles, with a focus on the visual presentation that will reduce language barriers and help to close the achievement gap between minority and non-minority students and in order to meet

the educational needs of low achieving and limited English proficient students. Jennifer Hutchings, High School Spanish and ESL teacher works closely with students and families at all campus levels who have limited English proficiency.

- 7. The school district will, with the assistance of its schools and parents, educate its teachers, pupil services personnel, principals and other staff, in how to reach out to, communicate with, and work with parents as equal partners, in the value and utility of contributions of parents, and in how to implement and coordinate parent programs and build ties between parents and schools, by:
 - Provide information to parents pertaining to the Volunteer Program and the various
 projects for which parents and community members can volunteer to assist building
 faculty and staff at each school campus; provide information to parents relating to
 the local Parent/Teacher Organization and their sponsored activities throughout the
 school year; encourage parental participation in extracurricular activities such as field
 trips, awards assemblies, after school programs, etc.
 - Information distributed to parents will be available in multiple language formats to accommodate the diverse student population; Interpreters will be provided to assist parents of English Language Learners communicate with their child's teacher and school personnel. Building level parent facilitators will be encouraged to attend the Arkansas State Parent Involvement Conference in November each fall. Parallel training will be provided to district faculty during each August teacher in-service. Throughout each school year, Superintendent D. Rolland as well as Principals Collett, Louks and Rieck will attend various parent involvement events, meetings and functions to be sure events are planned and do occur and provide feedback on suggested improvements.
 - The school district will, to the extent feasible and appropriate, coordinate and integrate
 parental involvement programs and activities with Head Start, Pre-K program, and
 other programs, and conduct other activities, such as parent resource centers that
 encourage and support parents in more fully participating in the education of their
 children.
 - Kelly Davis, Pre-K Coordinator, (728-4230) schedules various Pre-K events and serves as a contact person for parents, staff and community. Kelly coordinates the Pre-K Program Parent Orientation Night at which the following topics will be presented: Arkansas Better Chances Pre-Kindergarten Program Overview which describes parent and student expectations. Components of the Pre-K Curriculum described including the Early Reading First protocol and Pre-K ELLA program objectives. The assessments that will be administered during the school year. Opportunities for parents to volunteer in the Pre-K classrooms will be described. Extracurricular activities that will be scheduled for Pre-K students, such as field trips, presentations, Parent Nights, etc. Provide Parent Workshops, sponsored by the Center for Effective Parenting, on topics relating to parental involvement, student achievement, and parenting skills. Present the school-wide discipline plan that will provide the framework behavior for all students in the elementary building.
- 8. The school district will take the following actions to ensure that information related to the school and parent- programs, meetings, and other activities, is sent to the parents of participating children in an understandable and uniform format, including alternative formats upon request, and, to the extent practicable, in a language the parents can understand: Jennifer Hutchings, ESL Coordinator for the District works with students, staff and families that are not

proficient with English. Mrs. Hutchings regularly attends parent meetings to translate as needed during open house, FASFA events, career fairs, etc.

- Information will be sent to parents for all schedule meetings, programs, activities, parent workshops, and Parent Nights through the mediums listed below. All information will be produced and distributed in multiple languages to insure that parents/guardians of all students receive information in their native language.
- Articles published in the local newspapers; Facebook postings on the district Facebook page; Parent/Teacher Organization newsletters; Weekly Student Folders; Information distributed to parents at the Back-To-School Open House and Pre- Kindergarten Orientation; School-Parent Compacts; Student Handbooks; Communications for each extracurricular activity; and Phone Calls and email correspondences; and Information distributed at Parent/Teacher Conferences. Each Campus Principals: Rieck, Louks & Collett provide parents with the updated PSD Student Handbook which shares local, state and national education goals as well as the parent's right to know.
- The handbook describes the many programs that are available for parents to be involved with throughout the school year. Parents have access to the handbook on the district website, www.pangburnschools.org.
